that may be expressed about immigration, gun rights, or abortion are usually viewed by us from the perspective of our personal position on the topics. From our point of view the protest is legitimate or foolish based upon our agreement or denigration of it.

Is there a valid "Christian response" to these issues? Our instinct is to say yes, and to affirm that the valid response is in full alignment with my personal view. As a result, our reaction is to affirm or deny based on our own conclusions. Is this the way controversies were handled by early Christians?

In Acts 6, a group of Christians began to protest, concerned that the widows among the Greek speaking Jews were being overlooked in the food distribution by the native Jewish Christians. As the controversy swelled, the apostles reacted by having them select spiritual men from among themselves to handle the issue.

There was no statement of judgment regarding the facts, simply an effort to insure that the concerns were addressed. Do you suppose every individual was satisfied? Has it ever happened in history?

The point is, those in control heard the complaint and acted to include the minority in a manner that empowered them.

It happened in Acts 15 when concerns about things kosher and food eaten to idols was brought up. Again, action, not ignoring. We would do well to reexamine the text.
