Experiencing transcendence – encountering the Almighty is the greatest adventure of all, and the most amazing part of this grand adventure is, God is not far from each one of us. As the Apostle Paul told the Athenians, God "is not far from each one of us. 'For in him we live and move and have our being," (Acts 17:27, 28).
