Sappy Christmas Cards

Ah! It's the holiday season, and Christmas cards are beginning to pile up in the mailbox. As I was re-reading the story of the birth of Jesus from Luke 2, I noticed something odd. According to my beautiful Christmas cards, the angels sing to the shepherds:

"Glory to God in the highest, And on earth peace, Good will toward men" (Luke 2:14 KJV).

But according to my English Standard Version, they sing:

"Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!" What's the difference? In the older translations (and the New King James), God's goodwill is upon everyone in every place. On the other hand, in most of the modern English versions, God's goodwill is "among those with whom he is pleased." In other words, the blessing of peace rests on those who have found favor with God. So, the Apostle Paul wrote, "Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Romans 5:1).

It's a lovely Christmas thought to think that on the night Jesus

was born, the world enjoyed a respite from war and hatred, anger, and vengeance. So many sappy Christmas songs say it was so, but they are wrong. King Herod was in his palace, plotting evil. The emperor was still in Rome, and people's hearts were still black. The angels' song is a celebration of faithfulness. For those who find Christ, God grants peace. The bumper sticker got it right:

Know Jesus, know peace. No Jesus, no peace.



Technical Note: The manuscripts used to translate the KJV used the word eudokia, "goodwill" (subject case in Greek) while the older, better manuscripts used eudokias "of good will" or "characterized by [God's] goodwill" (genitive case). There is only one letter difference between the two words, but it completely changes the meaning. See William D. Mounce's wonderful Basics of Biblical Greek, p. 45.
