Every year I try to learn something new. Some years are wonderful! I love to sail, hike, take pictures, but other years aren't so great, like the year I learned to play golf. I enjoy being outside and walking across a beautiful course, but oh, what a frustrating game! One hole is perfect. You feel on top of the world, but then the next hole is a disaster, and you are ready to throw your clubs in the pond!

Not long into my year of golf, my patient friends introduced me to a beautiful golfing tradition called a "Mulligan." If your stroke didn't go the way you planned, just do it over. Take a "Mulligan," and it doesn't count. Wouldn't it be great if life was like that?

I've heard people wishing for a Mulligan, a do-over, for their lives. But, of course, we all make mistakes – some of them tragic beyond words, and most of us wish there were things from our past that we could change. But, unfortunately, it's been my experience that a do-over won't help because, more than likely, we'd just do it all

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over again, mistakes and all. So if we could do it over, we'd need something more than just a second chance.

One night, early in the ministry of Jesus, a ruler of the Jews, a Pharisee named Nicodemus, came to visit Jesus. He began his conversation by saying, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher come from God, for no one can do these signs that you do unless God is with him."

In response, Jesus promised Nicodemus a Mulligan: "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless one is born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." (See John 3:1 - 14.)

The adverb Jesus used: "again" (Greek: an-0-then άνωθεν), has two meanings. First, not only does it mean "again" (our second chance), it also means "from above." and that is precisely what we need. To just be born again would probably result in our just making the same mistakes over and over again what we need in a completely new birth with a brand new heart - a new way of thinking. That's the promise "from above."

It seems too good to be true, doesn't it? Jesus told Nicodemus, "Do not marvel that I said to you, 'You must be born again.'" (v. 7). It's the promise of God!

"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16).
